Being Church

Note the title of this article. It is not a detached academic reflection on "the Church" per se, but it involves us individually and collectively as the disciples of Christ who are the Church, the people of God.

What we want to do in this article is try to get a handle on how we, as God's people, understand ourselves now, this year, in the light of two important considerations: the 1700th year anniversary of the Nicene Creed, and the Jubilee Holy Year 2025, which is soon drawing to a close.


As Church, in this year 2025, we have celebrated the Nicene Creed not as a dry set of words which we rattle off each Sunday, but as a vibrant expression of our faith in the Most Holy Trinity, a faith rooted in baptism, and developed in our sacramental life, our love for God's word in the Scriptures, our communal life as brothers and sisters in Christ, and our mission to make him known. The *Catholic Link* articles based on each line of the Creed attempted to bring it to life in our spirituality and Christian practice, rather than see it as a short course in theology – Theology 101, as the expression goes. What we believe as Christians, and how we live, are two sides of the same coin.


We also need to consider that this is a Jubilee Year. Jubilee is something celebrated every 25 years. We have Pope Francis to thank for promoting its engaging theme, "Pilgrims of Hope". But Pope Francis did so against a

backdrop of the Synod on "synodality" which was spread over a few years. The process itself was a pilgrimage of hope in finding ways to implement Vatican Two's vision of the Church. Certainly, that vision was inspired by the Holy Spirit who reminded us that we are disciples of a humble man from Nazareth who taught us the Beatitudes, who washed feet, who was always filled with compassion for the poor, the sick and the sinners. Prior to Vatican II, as good Pope Saint John XXIII saw clearly, the Church had lost its way in its triumphalist assumption that in and of itself it was the Kingdom of God. No, like Christ himself, the Church's task is to proclaim the Kingdom of God for which in hope she prays, "Thy Kingdom come". Being Church for us means to be on pilgrimage, in hope, walking the road together ("syn hodos" in Greek, from which we get the word synod).

So, as we look back upon this year in the life of the Church, the 1700th anniversary of the Council of Nicaea, the Jubilee Year in which Pope Francis named us all "pilgrims of hope", let us heed the encouragement of the Letter to the Hebrews 12:2: Keep your eyes fixed on Jesus who leads us in our faith and brings it to perfection." Indeed, Jesus walks the way with us, because he is the Way.

Being Church is being born again in Christ through baptism, living his life within us, loving God and others, and bringing the Good News of hope to our troubled world.


